




Year 4 We are reading *The Roman Soldier's Handbook*.





If you have enjoyed finding out about being a Roman Soldier, You may want to read other non-fiction books about Ancient




Year 5

Next term we will be read *The Jaguar Trials* by Ruth Eastham.


You may like to read another book she has written.

If you enjoyed reading Journey to the River Sea in Year 5, you may like to try Escape to the River


What could you read at home?




A Little Princess by Frances Hodgson Burnett

The Ickabog by J.K. Rowling






The 13-Storey Treehouse by Andy Griffiths & Terry Denton

Arabian Nights by Anna Milbourne


