Lower School Reading Newsletter







There are other books to read in the series too.




What could you read at home?


Year 1


Year 2

The Pea and the Princess by Mini Grey



Once upon a time there was an enchanting fairytale about a prince who was looking for a real princess to be his bride. The only way to tell whether the many princesses who applied for the post were really royal was to see if they would be able to feel a tiny little pea through dozens of luxurious mattresses as they slept. This is a twist on the traditional tale 'The Princess and the Pea', but from the point of view of the Pea. It is a funny story and I have never read a book from the point of view of a pea before!

The Shark in the Pool By Pamela Butchart

Anything can happen at Wigglesbottom Primary School and it always does. Is there a shark in the swimming pool? YES! Can a play parachute make Danny Jenkins invisible? YES! Is that a dinosaur buried in the playground? YES! There are 3 short stories in this one book: The Shark in the Pool, Dinosaur Bones and The Parachute of invisibility. This book is one of a series and they are all worth reading.




The Girl Who Stole an Elephant by Nizrana Farook

Chaya, a no-nonsense, outspoken hero, leads her friends and a gorgeous elephant on a noisy, fraught, joyous adventure through the jungle where revolution is stirring and leeches lurk. Will stealing the queen's jewels be the beginning or the end of everything for the intrepid gang? A story of Robin Hood but set in India - Chaya steals from rich people and helps the people in her village who are poor.



Anna Hibiscus by Atinuke



The story follows a young African girl, Anna, who lives with her large, close-knit family of grandparents, aunts, uncles and cousins, including twin brothers. The family members lovingly help each other raise their families and share the workload. During a family vacation, Anna learns the importance of togetherness when her parents realise the value of their extended family. Anna also navigates cultural differences, such as her Auntie Comfort's life in America, and makes amends after unknowingly outcompeting local girls selling oranges. The story ends with Anna's excitement about visiting her Canadian grandmother to see snow, showcasing themes of family, identity, and belonging.
